Dear Parent / Carer,

Government guidance: Vulnerable children include children who are supported by social care, those with safeguarding and welfare needs, including child in need plans, on child protection plans, 'looked after' children, young carers, disabled children and those with [education, health and care \(EHC\) plans](#).

Further to our phone conversations yesterday I am writing to inform you of our education offer to you as parents/carers of children in receipt of an Education, Health and Care plan.

In line with government policy, we are offering term time only school hours, to all children with an EHCP. The Hub will NOT be open within the Easter and will therefore close on the 3rd April Pupils with an EHCP can return to school on the 20th April.

The provision will be provided through our Hub which is based at St Mary's. If your child currently attends the Hub at St Mary's and you wish for them to remain in school, their day will remain the same. If your child is in receipt of an EHCP and attends one of our other schools within The Trinity Federation and you wish for them to attend education, they will need to attend the Hub.

During this time our day will run from 9:00am until 3:00pm with the teaching team of Mrs Ratcliffe, Mr Lavell, Mrs Wright and Mrs Eyke, remaining the same (subject to their good health continuing) to keep both routine and structure as consistent as possible.

If you also fall into the Critical Worker category as outlined by government guidelines we will also be providing provision over the Easter break during those hours you will be required to work and you can request further details of this from Mrs Jayne Seal, administrator, at St. Mary's Bluecoat.

The most up to date government guidelines state the most recent scientific advice on how to further limit the spread of COVID 19 is clear. If children can stay at home, they should, to limit the chance of the virus spreading. This is why the government has asked parents to keep their children at home, wherever possible, and asked schools to remain open only for those children who ABSOLUTELY need to attend.

It is important to underline that schools, colleges and other educational establishments remain safe places for children. But the fewer children making the journey to school, and the fewer children in educational settings, the lower the risk that the virus can spread and infect vulnerable individuals in wider society.
